





June 1, 2021 - June 30, 2022





Kindergarten Readiness

Head Start, in partnership with parents, focuses on getting children ready for kindergarten. The program has six goals for each child to achieve:

- 1. All children will develop and display a sense of self-confidence in their abilities, and a strong identity that is rooted in their family and culture.
- 2. All children will engage with literature and language at a developmentally appropriate level.
- 3. All children will show an interest in varied topics and activities, and eagerness to learn, creativity, and independence in their interactions with activities and materials.
- 4. All children will use observation and manipulation, ask questions, make predictions, and develop hypotheses to gain a better understanding of information and activities in their surroundings.
- 5. All children will demonstrate control of large and small muscles and develop healthy and safe habits.
- 6. All children will demonstrate an understanding of, as well as use of a variety of words in English and their Home Language to communicate their ideas, feelings, and questions. They express knowledge of word categories and relationships among words during play, routines, learning activities, and conversations with others.

Parent Involvement Activities

Family engagement is an interactive process through which program staff, families and children build positive and goal-oriented relationships. Utah Community Action is guided by the Parent, Family and Community Engagement Framework which is a research-based guide where families are connected to positive interactions, referrals, resources and community engagement. Families work with classroom teams including Family Advocates who participate with parents in goal-setting to work toward self-sufficiency. Family engagement supports children and families in deep and meaningful ways. Parents participate actively in their child's education, including participating on a governing body, joining parent meetings and agency parent events. One of the many ways families are engaged and supported is through parent engagement nights. In the 2022-2023 school year, parent engagement nights focused on "Discovering the Magic of STEM." Children were able to participate in science experiments, engineering games, and other activities. Families were able to connect with community partners and resources. These events fostered a sense of community and allowed parents to support their children in learning about STEM.
